


Recommended books for reception




We're Going to Find the Monster by Malorie Blackman


The Day the Crayons Quit by Drew Daywalt




The New Libearian by Alison Donald




Monstersaurus by Claire Freedman




The Best Me! by Marvyn Harrison


Deep by Stephen Hogtun




Julian is a Mermaid by Jessica Love




Ten Delicious Teachers by Ross Montgomery


The Book With No Pictures The Book With No Pictures by B.J. Novak


Ruby's Worry by Tom Percival




The Bumblebear by Nadia Shireen




I'm Going to be a Princess by Stephanie Taylor




Gina Kaminski Saves the Wolf by Craig Barr-Green
